Text: Exodus 24:3-8

- I. Title
 - A. The word 'exodus' means, "Going out."
 - B. This name comes from the LXX Greek translation of the Old Testament.
 - C. The Jews called the book *shemoth* one of the first words of the book, meaning, "Names."
- ||. Author
 - A. The book of Exodus was written by Moses (Josh. 11:12; Jud. 3:4; Matt. 8:4; 19:7-8; 22:24; 23:2; John 5:45-46; Acts 3:22; 2 Cor. 3:7ff; etc.).
 - B. Though this is denied by modernistic scholars, the evidence is overwhelming.

- III. Date
 - A. It is difficult to determine an exact date for the events recorded in Exodus.
 - B. Some choose a late date of around 1225 BC, near the reign of Ramses II, but there are significant problems with this timeframe.
 - C. Others choose the earlier date of around 1450 BC, near the reign of Amenhotep II.
 - D. It is possible that the date was even earlier, but an exact time has not been determined.
