The Book of Exodus

The Third Three Plagues

Text: Exodus 9:13 – 10:29

Introduction:

- 1. As time went on and Pharaoh continued to rebel against God, the plagues upon Egypt became more and more severe.
- 2. As the consequences for Egypt became worse, Pharaoh's attempts to compromise with Moses and God became stronger.
- 3. Yet, in the end, God would prove His power and authority over all men including the Pharaoh of Egypt.
- 1. Plague Seven: HAIL

(Exodus 9:13-35)

- A. The Warning from God (vs. 13-17)
 - 1. As with the beginning of the previous groups of plagues, God told Moses to rise up early in the morning and speak to Pharaoh.
 - 2. This time, however, God made it known to Pharaoh that the plagues would be severe and devastating.
 - 3. "At this time" beginning with this plague God would send "all" of His plagues upon Egypt indicating that this was the beginning of the end.
 - 4. God would demonstrate the greatness of His power and prove His supremacy over all other false gods.
 - 5. These plagues would cause Egypt to be destroyed cut off from the earth.
 - 6. In fact, God had raised up Pharaoh for just this purpose.
- B. The Division in Egypt (vs. 18-21)
 - 1. God announced that the next plague would be a very grievous hail, like had never been before in Egypt.
 - 2. He warned the Egyptians to move their animals from the field into shelters and to remain indoors themselves.
 - 3. Those who respected God's word obeyed, while others ignored it and suffered the consequences.
- C. The Plague of Hail (vs. 22-26)
 - 1. The hail in this passage is exactly the same as we understand hail today.
 - 2. The words for "very grievous" mean, "Vehemently great or heavy."
 - 3. Thus, these were large hailstones that pelted and pounded the land, animals, and people of Egypt.
 - 4. The hail was accompanied by thunder, which means that there was lightning.
 - 5. Furthermore, "fire ran along upon the ground."
 - a. This possibly refers to fires started by the lightning.
 - b. Or, it may indicate the lightning itself being conducted along the ground and harming animals and man.
 - c. The phrase "fire mingled" is the same as that in Ezekiel 1:4, "A fire enfolding itself."
 - d. This seems to be a reference to something like ball lightning.
 - e. It was a clear demonstration of the power and glory of God.
 - 6. This is the first plague where it is stated that human life was lost.
 - 7. This plague did not affect the Israelites in the land of Goshen.

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- D. The Results of the Plague (vs. 27-35)
 - 1. This plague caused Pharaoh to make two great admissions:
 - a. "Jehovah is righteous"
 - b. "I have sinned"
 - 2. Pharaoh promised to let the Israelites go if this plague was ended.
 - 3. However, he hardened his heart and refused to do as he had promised.
 - 4. In this plague, the flax and the barley of Egypt were destroyed.
 - 5. Also, many flocks and herds had been decimated.
- E. This plague was an attack against many false gods of Egypt:
 - 1. Set $-god\ of\ storms$
 - 2. Nut goddess of the sky
 - 3. Shu *god of the atmosphere*
 - 4. Also, the many gods and goddesses of agriculture, fertility, and plant life

||. Plague Eight: LOCUSTS

(Exodus 10:1-20)

- A. God emphasized to Moses that these events were to be remembered and passed down throughout the generations of Israel.
 - 1. They were to learn the power of Jehovah.
 - 2. They were to learn the authority of Jehovah.
 - 3. They were to learn the love of Jehovah.
 - 4. They were to learn the folly of idolatry.
- B. The next plague upon Egypt was a devastating invasion of locusts.
 - 1. They would cover the ground and fill their houses.
 - 2. They would consume all that had been left from the plague of hail.
- C. After announcing the plague, and without waiting for a reply, Moses and Aaron left the presence of Pharaoh.
- D. Pharaoh's servants were tired of the suffering and asked Pharaoh to let the people of Israel go.
- E. Pharaoh called Moses back and offered him a compromise only the men (of fighting age) would be allowed to go.
- F. But, God had commanded all Israel to go, and there would be no compromise.
- G. Thus, the locusts came upon Egypt.
- H. Again, Pharaoh acknowledged his sin and asked for the plague to be removed.
- I. God removed the locusts, but Pharaoh again hardened his heart.

III. Plague Nine: DARKNESS

(Fxodus 10:21-29)

- A. The highest gods of Egypt gods of the Sun, Moon, and Stars were defeated by the plague of darkness.
- B. This darkness was unique for it could not be penetrated by human sight.
- C. For three days, the Egyptians could not see one another and were unable to move around outside of their houses.
- D. Again, Pharaoh offered a compromise Israel was to leave behind their flocks and herds.
- E. This deal was rejected and Pharaoh declared that if Moses appeared in his presence again he would be put to death.
