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# The Garden of Eden

#### I. The Earth before the Flood

(Genesis 2:4-6, 10)

- A. Rock Formation
  - 1. "Basement" rocks formed during Creation "foundations of the earth" (Job 38:4; Psa. 104:5; Prov. 8:27-29; Zech. 12:1; Heb. 1:10).
  - 2. Molded and formed by the Spirit and the activities of Day Three (Gen. 1:2, 9-10) orogeny, mountain building.
  - 3. Layers above (containing fossils) would have been deposited during the Flood.
- B. Plant Life
  - 1. Evidence (scientific and Biblical) points to a tropical climate over the planet before modern eras (that is, before the Flood) uniform temperature and abundant plant life.
  - 2. When Adam and Eve sinned, God cursed the ground to bring forth thorns and weeds (Gen. 3:17-19).
- C. Vapor Canopy (Theory)
  - 1. Uniform, warm climate around the globe
  - 2. No rain, strong winds, or storms (cf. Gen. 2:5-6, 10)
  - 3. Lush vegetation around the globe
  - 4. Protection from ultraviolet radiation
  - 5. Increased atmospheric pressure

#### II. The Garden of Eden

(Genesis 2:8-15, 19-20)

- A. Eden is the name of a place that once existed on the earth.
- B. In the eastern section of Eden, God planted a garden as a home for man.
- C. There, God caused trees to grow to please and support man.
- D. These included the Tree of Life in the middle of the garden and the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil.
- E. It was watered by a river that seems to have come from an underground source and then parted into four different rivers.
  - 6. The Hiddekel is another name for the Tigris River.
  - 7. However, the naming of the Tigris and the Euphrates does not prove that the Garden of Eden was in modern-day Iraq or the Middle East.
  - 8. The Flood destroyed and changed the world.
  - 9. It is likely that Noah's family named those rivers after one's they had known in the world before the Flood.
- F. The description of the land and its minerals demonstrates that this was a real place.
- G. Though Eden was beautiful and good, it was incomplete; for, God designed it with a goal in mind.
  - 1. Man was to work it and tend (guard, preserve) it.
  - 2. Man was to subdue the earth and fill it with offspring, implying that the Garden was to grow and expand with them (1:28).
  - 3. Revelation 2:7

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III. The Creation of Man and Woman

(Genesis 2:7, 16-25)

- A. Man's body was formed from the dust of the ground.
- B. God breathed into him the "breath of life."
- C. Man was created mature.
- D. Woman was created from a rib of man.
- E. Man was created in the image of God.
  - 1. Spirit (John 4:24)
  - 2. Free will
  - 3. Morality (including worship)
  - 4. Dignity
  - 5. Eternality
- F. Man was the pinnacle of God's creation a "little lower than the angels," not a little higher than the apes (cf. Psalm 8:5; Heb. 2:7, 9).
- IV. The First Home
  - A. One Man and One Woman

(Genesis 2:20-22)

- 1. No other arrangement will work.
- 2. The homosexual movement undermines the very foundation of society the family.
- B. One Family

(Genesis 2:23-25)

- 1. There is a leaving of father and mother.
- 2. There is a cleaving of one to the other.
- 3. There is unity (5:1-2; 3:20).
- C. One Lifetime

(Matthew 19:3-9)

- 1. Jesus' teaching on marriage goes all the way back to the creation.
- 2. Divorce is a plague upon society that God does not desire.
- D. One Authority

(Genesis 3:6-13)

- 1. The one authority in marriage must be God.
- 2. His authorized plan is revealed in His Word.
  - a. The husband is in subjection to God (1 Cor. 11:3).
  - b. The wife is in subjection to the husband (Eph. 5:22-25).
  - c. Children are in subjection to their parents (Eph. 6:1-3).
- 3. The family is God's authorized institution for rearing children (Deut. 11:18-21; Eph. 6:4).
- E. One Hope

(1 Peter 3:7)

- 1. The hope of every family should be Heaven.
- 2. Marriage is related to spirituality (1 Cor. 7:3-5).
- 3. Husbands and wives should be heirs together (1 Pet. 3:5-7).
