REMEMBER THE SABBATH DAY, TO KEEP IT HOLY MEANING FOR THE CHILDREN OF ISRAEL

Introduction:

- 1. Throughout this study, it must be emphasized that man today is not under the Law of Moses including the Ten Commandments.
- 2. However, the things that "were written aforetime were written for our learning" (Rom. 15:4).
- 3. THOU SHALT HAVE NO OTHER GODS BEFORE ME
- 4. THOU SHALT NOT MAKE ANY GRAVEN IMAGE
- 5. THOU SHALT NOT TAKE THE NAME OF THE LORD THY GOD IN VAIN

Overview:

- 1. In the religious world, there is much misunderstanding concerning the division between the Old Law and the New Testament.
- 2. Because of this, many mix parts of the two covenants when trying to determine what should be practiced in religion.
 - a. It is interesting that this problem does not seem to exist with relation to the Patriarchal Age.
 - b. Men seldom seek to bind commandments given before the Law of Moses onto the church today.
- 3. Thus, there are those who teach that Christians today should keep the Sabbath Day.
 - a. In fact, they mean that Christians should assemble to worship on Saturday instead of Sunday.
 - b. They do not keep the many, many restrictions that were a part of observing the Sabbath Day under the Law of Moses.
- 4. This lesson will consider what it meant truly to keep the Sabbath under the Law of Moses.
- I. What Was the Purpose of the Sabbath?
 - A. To remind them of the power of God (Exo. 20:8-11; Gen. 2:1-3)
 - 1. As they kept the Sabbath, they were to remember God's power displayed in the creation of the world.
 - 2. It was a reminder that God is in control and that His word is to be obeyed.
 - 3. It also demonstrated that His power was directed toward the care of His creation namely, man.
 - B. To remind them of the protection of God (Deut. 5:12-15)
 - 1. As they kept the Sabbath, they were to remember God's protection in delivering them from bondage in Egypt.
 - 2. In fact, they were to focus on their time as servants in Egypt.
 - 3. This was to create within them an attitude of dependence upon God and compassion for others, especially their servants and the downtrodden.
 - 4. Since God had cared for them, they should care for others.
 - C. To remind them of the <u>provision</u> of God (Exo. 16:23-29)

- 1. As they kept the Sabbath, they were to remember God's provision of manna in the wilderness.
- 2. This was to encourage their complete faith and trust in God.
- 3. It was also to keep them from becoming self-reliant and self-righteous.
- 4. This was emphasized even more strongly in the command concerning the Sabbath year (Exo. 23:10-11; Lev. 25:1-12, 19-22).
- D. To remind them of the promise of God (Isa. 56:1-7; 58:13-14)
 - 1. As they kept the Sabbath, they were to remember God's promise of blessing to those who obey His word.
 - 2. These promises were even offered to the Gentiles!
 - 3. Ultimately, it looked forward to the time of Christ and the blessing of salvation to the whole world.
- E. To remind them of the purpose of God (Exo. 31:13; Eze. 20:12)
 - 1. As they kept the Sabbath, they were to remember God's purpose in choosing them as His holy nation.
 - 2. This was not to cause them to become arrogant or prideful.
 - 3. Rather, it was to encourage their separation from the world in anticipation of the coming Messiah.
 - 4. Also, it was to emphasize the true rest of God in Heaven.
- II. What Was Not To Be Done on the Sabbath?
 - A. No work was to be done (Exo. 16:26; 20:10; 31:14-15; 35:2; Lev. 23:3).
 - B. No fire was to be kindled (Exo. 16:23; 35:3).
 - C. No travelling was to take place (Exo. 16:29; cf. Acts 1:12; Matt. 24:20).
 - D. No buying or selling was to be done (Amos 8:5; Neh. 10:31; 13:15-19).
 - E. No burden was to be borne (Jer. 17:21-22).
 - F. One's own pleasure was not to be done (Isa. 58:13).
- III. What Was To Be Done on the Sabbath?
 - A. The Sabbath was to be remembered or kept (Exo. 20:8; Deut. 5:12).
 - B. The Sabbath was to be kept holy or sanctified (Exo. 20:8; Deut. 5:12).
 - C. The Sabbath was to be a day of rest.
 - D. New shewbread was to be placed in the Tabernacle (Lev. 24:8; 1 Chr. 9:32).
 - E. Sacrifice was to be made (Num. 28:9-10).

Conclusion:

- 1. The Sabbath was made for man (Mark 2:27).
- 2. Jesus is Lord of the Sabbath (Mark 2:28).
- 3. The Sabbath is fulfilled in Christ (Matt. 11:28-30).
- 4. God's true Sabbath rest is Heaven (Heb. 4:1-11).
- 5. Let no man judge you in respect of the Sabbath (Col. 2:16).
