## THE CHURCH

## AND THE CROSS OF CHRIST

Introduction:

- 1. The New Testament uses many terms and concepts to describe the church of Christ.
- 2. As members of the church, it is important for us to know what the church is and what the Lord expects it to be.
- 3. Thus, as we study these divine descriptions of the church, we will learn how we are to conduct ourselves individually and as a congregation of God's people.
- 4. Before we discuss the specific terms of designation, there are a few fundamental facts that must be considered.
- 5. First, we must understand the role of the church in God's plan of redemption...
  - a. Eternal purpose
  - b. Connected to the crucifixion
- I. The Shame of the Cross
  - A. Historically, the cross was an instrument of shame, torture, and death reserved for the vilest of criminals.
    - 1. Crucifixions were public for the shaming of the offender.
    - 2. They were meant to be a deterrent to others.
  - B. Death upon a cross was considered to be the most horrible that a man could suffer.
  - C. Before the crucifixion, several other means of punishment were usually employed.
    - 1. The guilty person was often beaten or scourged whipped severely.
    - 2. The offender was forced to carry or drag the crossbeam to the place of crucifixion.
    - 3. Along the route, bystanders would mock and spit upon the criminal.
  - D. At the place of crucifixion, the condemned man was stripped of his garments and his hands were affixed to the cross (by ropes or nails).
  - E. When lifted up on the cross, his feet were then fastened to it as a means of support to prolong the slow suffering and death of crucifixion.
    - 1. For many, death would not come for several days.
    - 2. To hasten the death of a criminal, his legs could be broken.
  - F. Imagine the sinless and pure Son of God enduring such a shameful and agonizing death! (Cf. Phil. 2:8; Heb. 12:2)
    - 1. Imagine living the life that He did knowing that crucifixion awaited Him at the end of it (cf. Matt.16:21; 26:1-2)!
    - 2. Imagine betraying the Son of God to such a death (Matt. 26:47-50)!
  - G. Knowing what was to come, Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper to memorialize His death (Matt. 26:26-30; 1 Cor. 11:26).
  - H. Knowing what was to come, Jesus agonized and prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane (Matt. 26:38-39; Luke 22:44).
  - I. Knowing what was to come, Jesus remained silent before His accusers only stating the truth the He was the Son of God (Matt. 26:59-66).
  - J. Then, Jesus willingly submitted Himself to death upon the cross.
    - 1. He was spat upon, mocked, and beaten (Matt. 26:67-68).
    - 2. He was denied by His followers (Matt. 26:69-75).
    - 3. He was rejected for a thief and murderer (Matt. 27:17, 22-23).

## Biblical Description of the Church

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Acts 20:28

- 4. He was scourged (Matt. 27:26).
- 5. He was mocked with a crown of thorns (Matt. 27:27-31).
- 6. He was crucified (Matt. 27:35).
- 7. He died (Matt. 27:50).
- K. On the cross, Jesus suffered terribly (Psalm 22:1-20).
- II. The Blood of the Cross
  - A. In His suffering, Jesus changed the cross from an image of shame to a picture of love and grace (cf. John 3:16).
  - B. By shedding His blood upon the cross, Jesus purchased redemption for man (John 19:34).
    - 1. His blood ratified the New Covenant (Matt. 26:28).
    - 2. His blood is the propitiation for sin (Rom. 3:25).
    - 3. His blood brings justification (Rom. 5:9).
    - 4. His blood creates communion (1 Cor. 10:16).
    - 5. His blood gives forgiveness of sin (Eph. 1:7).
    - 6. His blood restores fellowship (Eph. 2:13, 16).
    - 7. His blood redeems (Col. 1:14).
    - 8. His blood makes peace (Col. 1:20).
    - 9. His blood removes the Old Covenant (Col. 2:14).
    - 10. His blood gives eternal redemption (Heb. 9:12).
    - 11. His blood purges (Heb. 9:14).
    - 12. His blood grants boldness (Heb. 10:19).
    - 13. His blood sanctifies (Heb. 13:12).
    - 14. His blood cleanses (1 John 1:7).
    - 15. His blood washes away sin (Rev. 1:5; 7:14; cf. Acts 22:16).
    - 16. His blood grants victory (Rev. 12:11).
  - C. Therefore, the blood of Christ is precious (1 Peter 1:19)!
- III. The Church and the Cross
  - A. Yet, that same blood of Jesus shed upon the cross also purchased the church (Acts 20:28).
  - B. Thus, when one's sins are washed away by Jesus' blood, that same blood makes him a part of the Lord's church (cf. Acts 2:38, 41, 47).
  - C. If the blood is precious, then that which was purchased by the blood is just as precious!
  - D. We must learn to love and to treasure the church as much as the cross of Christ (cf. Heb. 10:25-31)!
  - E. The church of Christ cannot be separated from the cross of Christ!
