THE KINGDOM OF CHRIST

Introduction:

- 1. The New Testament uses many terms and concepts to describe the church of Christ.
- 2. As members of the church, it is important for us to know what the church is and what the Lord expects it to be.
- 3. Thus, as we study these divine descriptions of the church, we will learn how we are to conduct ourselves individually and as a congregation of God's people.
- 4. The role of the church in God's plan of redemption...
 - a. Eternal purpose
 - b. Connected to the crucifixion
 - c. Result of the resurrection

- I. The Israel of God

(Galatians 6:16)

- A. In the Old Testament, God formed the children of Israel into a nation.
- B. That nation was a kingdom that belonged to and was ruled by God (Exo. 19:6; cf. Matt. 8:10-12).
- C. When the New Testament came into effect, the Old Testament was completed and fulfilled; thus, it ended (cf. Rom. 7:4; Col. 2:14; Heb. 10:9; etc.).
- D. Under the New Covenant, the church is called "the Israel of God" (Gal. 6:16).
- E. Thus, the church is the kingdom of Christ (Gal. 3:7-9, 26-29; 1 Pet. 2:9).
- II. The Kingdom of Christ

(Matthew 16:18-19)

- A. The Greek word for 'kingdom' means, "Power, sovereignty, or rule."
- B. Thus, this word has many applications in the New Testament.
 - 1. The power of God is called the 'kingdom' (Matt. 12:28).
 - 2. Heaven is called the 'kingdom' (Matt. 25:34; Luke 13:28; 2 Tim. 4:18; 2 Pet. 1:11).
 - 3. The church is called the 'kingdom' (Matt. 11:11; etc.).
- C. Proof that the church is the kingdom of Christ:
 - 1. Both began in Jerusalem (Isa. 2:2-4; Acts 2)
 - 2. Both began in the 'last days' (Joel 2; Acts 2)
 - 3. Both began in the days of the Roman Empire (Dan. 2:44; Acts 2)
 - 4. Both have the same terms of admission (Matt. 16:18-19; Acts 2:38, 47; cf. John 3:5)
 - 5. Both have the same members (Col. 1:13)
 - 6. Both have the same memorial (Matt. 26:29; 1 Cor. 11:20ff)
- D. Thus, the church is the kingdom of Christ.
- III. The Nature of the Kingdom

(Luke 17:20-21)

A. The church is a spiritual kingdom (John 12:34; 6:15; Matt. 27:42; Luke 24:21; Acts 1:6; Luke 17:20-21; John 18:36).

Biblical Description of the Church

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- B. The church is a glorious kingdom.
 - 1. Because of its King (Psa. 2:6-7; 110:1)
 - 2. Because of its law (Jam. 1:25)
 - 3. Because of its banner (Gal. 3:13; 6:14)
 - 4. Because of its citizens (Gal. 4:4-7; 1 John 3:1; Rom. 8:16-17)
- C. The church is a peaceable kingdom (Isa. 2:4; 9:6-7; 11:6; John 13:35; Matt. 18:4; 20:25-26).
- D. The church is a victorious kingdom (Matt. 16:18; Rev. 11:15; 17:14).
- E. The Christian must live as a citizen of God's glorious kingdom (Phil. 3:20; 1:27).
