Burdens Become Blessings

Introduction:

- 1. Many things that we view as burdens can become blessings when properly used or understood.
- 2. The Bible illustrates this idea with the figure of childbirth (John 16:20-22).
- 3. Hardship, pain and suffering often bring the greatest blessings.

I. The Burden of Labor Noah

- A. Physical labor results in physical blessings (Genesis 3:17-19; Isaiah 65:21-22; 2 Thessalonians 3:10).
- B. Noah illustrates this principle in his building the ark (Genesis 6:14-22).
 - 1. He was given a tremendous burden to build an ark.
 - 2. Without doubt, it took many months to complete (cf. Genesis 6:3).
 - 3. This was in addition to his burden of everyday life providing for his family, preaching to sinners, etc.
 - 4. Yet, when the work was accomplished, Noah received the greatest blessing the salvation of his family from the flood.
- C. In like manner, spiritual labor results in spiritual blessings (1 Corinthians 15:58; 3:8; Galatians 6:9-10).
 - 1. Helping the less fortunate...
 - 2. Visiting the sick...
 - 3. Preparing the Lord's Supper...
 - 4. Teaching a Bible class...

II. The Burden of Distinctiveness *Timothy*

- A. Timothy was the product of a mixed marriage his father was a Gentile and his mother was a Jew.
- B. Certainly, this caused problems for Timothy in the culture of his day (cf. John 4:9; Acts 10:28).
- C. Yet, God was able through Paul to use Timothy to preach the Gospel to both Jew and Gentile!
- D. Christians must be distinctive, different from the world.
 - 1. So, the world will try to isolate us.
 - 2. We will be ridiculed and persecuted.
 - 3. But, God can still use us to teach and preach His Word.
- E. Our burdens may become a blessing to others.

III. The Burden of Preaching *Isaiah*

- A. Isaiah was called by God to be a prophet a spokesman for Jehovah (Isaiah 6:8-
- B. Yet, his preaching would be a burdensome task, for the nation would reject him.
 - 1. What a discouraging task!
 - 2. Yet, Isaiah faced it with true devotion and faithfulness.
- C. Ultimately, a blessing came from his work a remnant was saved.
- D. All Christians must bear the burden of preaching.
 - 1. It is a burden to go into "all the world" (Matt. 28:18-20; Mark 16:15-16).
 - 2. It is a burden face rejection and ridicule.
 - 3. It is a burden to study diligently the Scriptures.
 - 4. But, the blessings of these efforts are eternal.

IV. The Burden of Sickness

Man Blind from Birth

- A. Certainly, it is a burden to go through life without the blessing of sight.
- B. However, God was able to use this man's burden to glorify His Son (John 9:1-7).
- C. God can use our burden of sickness to bless our lives and the lives of others.
 - 1. Illness reminds us of what is truly important in life (priorities).
 - 2. How we deal with sickness can demonstrate the power of faith in God to others.
 - 3. Sickness can bring us closer to God and to God's people.

V. The Burden of Grief

Anna

- A. Anna was married for seven years, and then her husband died.
- B. She lived as a widow until the age of 84 (Luke 2:36-38).
- C. However, she did not allow her grief to separate her from God.
- D. Instead, she drew closer to Him and became a faithful servant.
- E. Grief can become a source of blessing in our lives and in the lives of others.
 - 1. Grief reminds us of our dependence upon God.
 - 2. Grief encourages us to long for Heaven.
 - 3. Enduring grief teaches us how to help others (cf. 2 Corinthians 1:3-4).

VI. The Burden of Sacrifice

Jesus

- A. It is not easy to sacrifice things that we hold dear.
- B. Yet, our Lord set an example of sacrifice for us to follow.
 - 1. He humbly gave up equality with God (Philippians 2:6).
 - 2. He left the glories of Heaven.
 - 3. He sacrificed having servants for being one (Philippians 2:7).
 - 4. He gave up a heavenly body for a physical one (2:7).
 - 5. He sacrificed His body on the cross (2:8).
 - 6. He sacrificed His life at Calvary.
 - 7. He sacrificed His blood freely.
- C. His sacrifice resulted in abundant blessings.
 - 1. Salvation (Redemption)
 - 2. Reconciliation (Fellowship)
 - 3. Adoption (Church)
 - 4. Mediation (Prayer)
- D. When we must bear the burden of sacrifice, we must remember the blessing that will come.
 - 1. Submission to the Word of God
 - 2. Leave home to go and preach
 - 3. Live as a servant to others
 - 4. Wear out our bodies in His service
 - 5. Give our lives, faithful unto death
 - 6. Blood, sweat and tears for the kingdom

Conclusion: Burdens will come, but blessings will follow.
