The Battle for Canaan The Battle with the Amorites

Text: Joshua 10

- I. The Five Amorite Kingdoms (Joshua 10:1-5)
 - A. The Amorites became afraid after witnessing the defeat of Jericho and Ai.
 - B. When the people of Gibeon made an alliance with Israel, the Amorites knew they had to act.
 - C. Thus, the kings of five cities joined their armies together to fight against Gibeon.
 - 1. Jerusalem (Adoni-Zedek)
 - a. Adoni means, "Lord."
 - b. Zedek means, "Justice or righteousness."
 - c. This name may be a title given to kings of



Jerusalem in imitation of the name Melchizedek.

- 2. Hebron (Hoham)
- 3. Jarmuth (Piram)
- 4. Lachish (Japhia)
- 5. Eglon (Debir)
- D. The people of Gibeon called upon Israel to help them leading to a massive battle on a remarkable day.
- II. The Lord Fights for Israel

(Joshua 10:6-15)

- A. The entire army of Israel came from Gilgal and traveled through the night to fight at Gibeon.
- B. They came with the promise of God that not one man would be able to stand against them.
- C. Thus, the Lord actively and miraculously fought for Israel.
- D. First, He caused the Amorites to become confused and panicked resulting in their slaughter and flight.
- E. Then, as they fled, He caused great hailstones to fall from the sky killing more men than had died in the fighting!
- F. Finally, He caused the sun and the moon to stand still in the sky prolonging daylight until Israel could soundly defeat their enemies! (Cf. Hab. 3:11)
 - 1. For some reason, many who accept the other miracles of the Bible seek to disprove or discredit this one.
 - 2. God delayed the setting of the sun until the battle was completed.
 - 3. However He chose to do this is a matter of His sovereignty!
 - 4. Yet, it must be remembered that it was an answer to Joshua's prayer.
- G. Thus, the enemies of Israel were defeated and Joshua and the people returned to Gilgal.



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III. The Defeat of the Five Kings

(Joshua 10:16-27)

- A. This battle took place in three stages:
 - 1. The surprise attack at Gibeon (10:9-10a)
 - 2. The pursuit from Gibeon (10:10b-14)
 - 3. The pursuit from Makkedah (10:16-20)
- B. As Israel pursued their enemies, the kings of the five cities hid in a cave at Makkedah.
- C. Joshua ordered large stones to be placed at the entrance to the cave and men to guard it so those kings would not escape.
- D. Israel continued to pursue and defeat their enemies before returning back to the cave at Makkedah where no one dared speak against them (cf. Exo. 11:7).
- E. Joshua brought the five kings out of the cave and ordered the captains of Israel to put their feet upon the necks of their enemies as a reminder of God's promise to give them victory.
- F. Then, the kings were killed and hanged upon five trees until evening.
- G. As the sun set, the dead bodies were removed from the trees and sealed in the cave where they had hidden.
- IV. The Southern Campaign

(Joshua 10:28-43)

- A. On that same day, Israel defeated the city of Makkedah beginning the southern campaign of Israel into Canaan.
- B. From Makkedah they journeyed to Libnah, Lachish (where Gezer was also defeated), Eglon, Hebron, and Debir defeating each city as they went.
- C. Thus, the entire southern region of Canaan was defeated and conquered by Israel - from Kadesh-barnea to Gaza, Goshen to Gibeon.
- D. God fought for Israel and drove out their enemies from before them.
