Judges 17:6; 21:25

EVERY MAN DID RIGHT IN HIS OWN EYES

Introduction: 2 Corinthians 5:7 (an eternal principle)

- 1. During the time of the judges, there was no earthly king in Israel.
- 2. However, God was their King!
- 3. The book of Judges records (among other things) the digression of Israel from a theocracy (ruled by God) to a monarchy (ruled by man).
- 4. Yet, their desire for an earthly king was only a symptom of a deeper problem.
- 5. The people of Israel had chosen to walk by sight and not by faith...
- I. Walking by Sight Led to Idolatry
 - A. Because God is invisible, man has a tendency to forget Him.
 - B. Israel was faithful to God when they had tangible evidence of His presence.
 - 1. To them, Moses was tangible evidence that God was with them.
 - 2. When Moses lingered on Mount Sinai, the Israelites desired some new, tangible proof of God (Exodus 20:22-23; 24:12-18; 32:1-6).
 - 3. Thus, they made and worshipped the golden calf.
 - C. Their lack of faith led them into idolatry.
 - 1. True faith is evidence of things not seen (Hebrews 11:1).
 - 2. True faith allows one to see the invisible God (Hebrews 11:27).
 - D. There are many idolaters today.
 - 1. They may not bow down to an image, but they walk by sight and not faith.
 - 2. Sadly, they are even found in the church (1 Corinthians 10:1-14).
- II. Walking by Sight Led to Ignorance
 - A. Following the death of Moses, Joshua became the leader of Israel.
 - 1. Though Joshua was chosen by God to lead Israel, he did not have the same authority as Moses.
 - 2. The duties of Moses were divided between Joshua and the High Priest (Numbers 27:15-23).
 - B. When Joshua died, the Israelites were again left with what they considered to be no tangible evidence of God's presence.
 - 1. The book of Judges deals with their disobedience and rebellion due to walking by sight and not faith.
 - 2. They consistently turned to idols when each judge fulfilled his role as leader and deliverer.
 - C. However, God had not left them to wander aimlessly on their own.
 - 1. He gave them His book to guide them (Deuteronomy 12:1-8).
 - 2. He gave them His priesthood to educate them (Leviticus 10:8-11;
 - 2 Chronicles 15:3; 17:8-9; Micah 3:11; Malachi 2:7).
 - 3. He gave them the High Priest to mediate for them (cf. Judges 1:1).
 - D. Yet, God's Word and His way were not good enough for them.
 - 1. They ignored, rejected, and disobeyed the Law of Moses.
 - 2. They neglected the worship and service at the Tabernacle.
 - 3. The priests failed in their role of educating the people.
 - 4. They failed to ask God for guidance in their works.
 - E. Sadly, their attitudes continue to flourish even in the church.

- III. Walking by Sight Led to Immaturity
 - A. God was a perfect and faithful King to Israel.
 - B. However, when they walked by sight, they desired an imperfect, inferior king chosen from among men.
 - C. They did what was right in <u>their</u> eyes instead of doing what is right in <u>God's</u> eyes.

Conclusion:

- 1. Walking by faith brings blessings (Leviticus 26:1-12).
- 2. Walking by sight brings suffering (Leviticus 26:13-39).
- 3. Repentance brings salvation (Leviticus 26:40-46).
