Judges 1:1-20

CONQUERING THE LAND OF CANAAN

Introduction:

- 1. There was no king in Israel...
- 2. Every man did right in his own eyes...
- 3. The cycle of the Judges...
- 4. The first chapter of the book of Judges serves as both a background and a foundation for what follows in the book.
- 5. It tells of the work of the Israelites to conquer the land of Canaan.
- The Justice of God

(1:1-7)

- A. The first thing one notices in the book of Judges is God's involvement with His people and with the nations of the world.
 - 1. God was still with them even though Joshua had died.
 - 2. God was still available to answer their questions and guide them in their work.
 - a. Through His book...
 - b. Through the priests...
 - c. Through the High Priest...
 - God was still working to help them win their battles.
- B. In allowing the Israelites to conquer the land of Canaan, God was actually carrying out His justice.
 - 1. When God delivered the Canaanites and Perizzites into the hand of Israel, ten thousand of them were killed.
 - 2. However, God simply was not being cruel.
 - 3. Their destruction was actually a punishment for their wickedness (cf. Genesis 15:16).
 - 4. God had given them hundreds of years to repent, but they refused and rebelled.
- C. To illustrate this principle of justice, the story of Adonibezek is recorded.
 - 1. As Israel fought against their enemies, they pursued the ruler of Bezek and captured him.
 - 2. Following this, they cut off his thumbs and big toes.
 - a. This would end his days as a warrior.
 - b. Think of the spiritual condition of a wounded warrior.
 - 3. Adonibezek recognizes this as a just punishment from God.
 - 4. He had done the same thing to 70 kings and now he was reaping what he had sown (cf. Galatians 6:7-8).
- D. This lesson is seen throughout the Bible God is a just God.
- II. The Value of Unity

(1:3, 17)

- A. The tribe of Simeon helped the tribe of Judah drive out their enemies.
- B. The tribe of Judah helped the tribe of Simeon drive out their enemies.
- C. There are several reasons why these two tribes worked together.
 - 1. They were located beside one another and had common interest in driving out the nearest enemies.
 - 2. They were brethren and sought to help one another (Gen. 35:23).
 - 3. They were a larger force for good when they worked together.
- D. God does not need great numbers to accomplish His work, but brethren who work together in unity are able to share the burden.

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- 1. Brethren should work in unity within the congregation.
- 2. Congregations can work together in unity as well.
- III. The Necessity of Courage (1:8-13, 20)
 - A. Judah displayed great courage in their battles against the Canaanites.
 - B. That courage is exemplified in the man named Othniel.
 - 1. Othniel captured Debir and won Caleb's daughter as a wife.
 - 2. He also would become the first judge over the Israelites.
 - C. It is further demonstrated in the actions of Caleb.
 - 1. Caleb was one of the faithful men who first spied out the land of Canaan (Numbers 13 14).
 - 2. Along with Joshua, he declared that Israel could conquer the land.
 - 3. However, in their searching out the land they came upon the city of Hebron and found it inhabited by giants, the children of Anak [also known as the Anakims] (Numbers 13:22, 28-33).
 - 4. Thus, ten of the spies and the majority of the nation were discouraged and failed to enter Canaan.
 - 5. Of that generation, only Joshua and Caleb would dwell in the land.
 - 6. Furthermore, God promised to give Caleb the land of Hebron (Deuteronomy 1:34-36).
 - 7. So, when he was 85 years old, Caleb went to battle against the Anakims and conquered Hebron (Joshua 14:6-15).
 - D. The courage of Caleb, Othniel and Judah was built upon their faith in God.
 - 1. True faith casts out fear and doubt.
 - 2. True faith is obedient and active.
 - 3. True faith is brave, bold and courageous.

Conclusion:

- 1. While setting the stage for what will follow in the book of Judges, this chapter also teaches important lessons about serving God.
- 2. God is just therefore, He is no respecter of persons and man will reap what he sows.
- 3. Unity with brethren is essential to carrying out the work of God.
- 4. True faith produces workers with courage to confront the enemies of God.
