THE COURAGE OF A LEADER

Introduction:

- 1. The cycle of the Judges...
- 2. Othniel was the first man chosen by God to be a judge (or, deliverer) over the Israelites.
- 3. As a judge, Othniel demonstrates the characteristics of a servant of God who is a leader of His people.
- 4. "The sheep are still the same, but they have another shepherd."
- I. Othniel: A Man of Courage

(1:9-13)

- A. He followed a godly example.
 - 1. Othniel was the nephew of Caleb.
 - 2. He imitated Caleb's example of courage and faith.
- B. He possessed a great faith in God.
- C. He was a leader who led!
 - 1. Josephus says he was "an active man, and of great courage."
 - 2. Jewish secular history tells of his actions provoking others to fight against the Canaanites.
- D. There is little wonder why God chose Othniel as a judge over Israel.
- II. Othniel: A Man of Humility

(3:9-10)

- A. Submission
 - He was dependent upon the power of God for victory.
 - a. Othniel was directed by the Holy Spirit.
 - b. Without doubt, this is similar to the work of other divinely guided men Moses, Gideon, and, in a sense, the apostles.
 - 2. The Holy Spirit guides through the Word of God.
 - a. In miraculous times, it was given by inspiration.
 - b. Today, it is given in the written word.
 - 3. Good leaders must be submissive to the will of God in word and deed (cf. Matthew 23:3).
- B. Willingness
 - 1. He was willing to accept his role in God's plan.
 - a. God told them to drive out the Canaanites.
 - Othniel understood that God meant him.
 - c. "Go ye" means "Go me."
 - 2. He was willing to serve in the face of great risk.
 - 3. He was willing to step up into the role of a judge.
 - a. Deliverer (3:9)
 - b. Savior (Nehemiah 9:27)
 - c. Type of Christ (Micah 5:1)
 - 4. Good leaders must be willing servants (cf. 1 Timothy 3:1)
- C. Obedience
 - 1. He is pictured as one who was dedicated to following God.
 - 2. According to Jewish tradition, Othniel was ranked by the Jewish rabbis as first in holiness of character.

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- 3. Thus, he judged Israel according to God's standard.
 - a. Note the sequence in verse 10.
 - b. First, God chose Othniel.
 - c. Second, he judged (corrected) Israel.
 - d. Then, they went to war.
 - e. Finally, there was peace for 40 years during which time Othniel continued to lead and judge Israel.
- 4. Good leaders must be obedient to God's Word (1 Cor. 11:1).
- D. Compassion
 - 1. Clearly, Othniel felt the oppression and suffering of the nation.
 - 2. Even though Israel was to blame, Othniel (and God) still cared for them.
 - 3. Good leaders must be compassionate toward others (Matt. 9:36).
- III. Othniel: A Man of Family (1:14-15)
 - A. His forebears...
 - 1. He came from a family of faithful fighters.
 - 2. He worked to live up to the good example of his ancestors.
 - 3. We all stand on the shoulders of others.
 - B. His wife...
 - 1. He sought for a wife who had the same standards, understanding and goals as he had.
 - 2. He married a woman who was humble before God.
 - 3. His wife was one who was assertive in support of the family.
 - 4. Is it any wonder that the families of leaders in the Lord's church are to meet certain qualifications as well as the leader himself?
 - C. His descendants...
 - 1. He reared his children to be servants of God (1 Chron. 27:1, 15).
 - 2. Some of them were leaders in the role of protecting the nation.
 - 3. A good leader must pass his knowledge on to future generations (Genesis 18:19).

Conclusion:

- Though little is said about the man Othniel, much can be learned about the kind of individual God wants as His servant.
- 2. Othniel was a great leader and deliverer of Israel.
- 3. May we learn to imitate his example as servants of Christ.
