Proverbs 1:7

THE WISDOM OF SOLOMON PART 2: THE FEAR OF THE LORD

Introduction:

- 1. Three things are necessary to possessing true wisdom:
 - a. A proper knowledge of God
 - b. A proper respect for parents
 - c. A proper understanding of the world
- 2. Job asked, "Where shall wisdom be found?" (Job 28:12).
- 3. It is not to be found in the imagination or inventiveness of men (Job 28:1-12).
- 4. It is not to be found for purchase by money (Job 28:13-19).
- 5. It is not to be found by man's sight (Job 28:20-21).
- 6. It is not to be found in death (Job 28:22).
- 7. It is only understood by God, for it is His very nature (Job 28:23-27).
- 8. God declared to man the answer: "Behold, the fear of the Lord, that is wisdom; and to depart from evil is understanding" (Job 28:28).
- 9. By revelation, Solomon understood this truth and emphasized it in the book of Proverbs.
- I. The Fear of the Lord
 - A. This phrase refers to a holy fear, a reverential respect for Jehovah.
 - B. It is not the fear of an angry tyrant or an abusive parent.
 - 1. God's love for His children is benevolent (Matt. 7:7-11).
 - 2. God's love sacrificed greatly for man (John 3:16; Rom. 5:8).
 - C. In response to the love of God, man expresses his love in reverence and humble submission (1 John 4:16-19).
 - D. Thus, he will listen to God's Word, study it deeply, apply it in his life, and live according to its instructions.
 - E. By so doing, he will grow in both knowledge and wisdom.
- II. The Fear of the Lord Produces Wisdom (Proverbs 1:7; 9:10; 15:33)
 - A. True knowledge and wisdom begin with a reverence for Jehovah (1:7; 9:10).
 - B. One who fears the Lord will also trust Him and seek out, learn, and obey His will (cf. Prov. 3:5-6: Rev. 1:3; 2:7).
 - 1. One who doubts the existence of God will not (cf. Psa. 14:1).
 - 2. One who disbelieves in the love of God will not.
 - 3. One who is apathetic about God will not.
 - 4. One who is prejudiced or deceived about God will not.
 - 5. One who is proud will not.
 - C. The fear of the Lord demands humility (15:33; cf. Isa. 6:5; Matt. 5:3-6; 18:3).
 - D. Without the knowledge of God and His Word, one is left with only human wisdom which is utter folly (cf. mythology, idolatry, occultism, etc.).
- III. The Fear of the Lord Grants Forgiveness (Proverbs 16:6; 8:13; 1:29)
 - A. It is by God's mercy and truth that man's sins may be atoned for (purged).
 - B. The fear of the Lord brings one to a knowledge of God, His character, and His will; then produces a desire to depart from evil (cf. 2 Cor. 7:10).
 - C. A reverence for God causes one to hate evil (8:13).
 - D. Those who do not fear the Lord face destruction and death (1:27-30).

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- IV. The Fear of the Lord Gives Life (Proverbs 14:27; 10:27; 15:16; 19:23)
 - A. Reverence for Jehovah will lead one to the fountain of spiritual life (14:27).
 - B. It is a life devoted to the pursuit of wisdom and righteousness (2:1-5).
 - C. It is a life prolonged by avoiding that which is evil and deadly (10:27).
 - D. It is a life contented with spiritual blessings instead of material possessions (15:16; cf. Mark 10:24-25; 1 Tim. 6:6ff).
 - E. It is a life free from envy and lived in hope (23:17-18; 31:30).
 - F. It is a life of righteous action (14:2).
 - G. It is a life of abundant blessings (19:23; 22:4).
 - H. It is a life of spiritual security (14:26; 28:14).
 - I. It is a life of stability (24:21-22).

Conclusion:

- 1. Let us all seek to have a reverential and respectful fear of the Lord.
- 2. Then, and only then, can we find the wisdom needed to live a godly life.
