## **Ecclesiastes 3**

## THE PROVIDENCE OF GOD UNDER THE SUN

## Introduction:

- 1. The book of Ecclesiastes records the "wisdom" of Solomon as he sought for meaning and purpose in life without the wisdom of God.
- 2. It was the great experiment of his life and serves as a powerful warning to all mankind.
- 3. Without God, all is vanity and vexation of spirit...
- I. The Examination of Providence
  - A. The word 'providence' appears only one time in the KJV (Acts 24:2).
    - 1. The Greek word is *pronoia* ( $\pi \rho o v o \iota \alpha$ ) which means, "To make provision, forethought, or providential care."
    - 2. Here, Tertullus used it flatteringly to refer to the provision and forethought of Felix in keeping peace in the nation.
    - 3. This word is used only once more in the New Testament where it is translated as "provision" (Romans 13:14).
  - B. The Providence of God refers to Jehovah's provision for His creation and especially His faithful children.
    - 1. General providence refers to God's care for the Creation as a whole (cf. Gen. 8:22; Matt. 5:45; Acts 17:28; etc.).
    - 2. Special providence refers to God's acting on behalf of His divine purpose and His faithful disciples (cf. Prov. 8:17; John 7:17; Acts 17:27; Matt. 6:33; etc.).
  - C. God is able to work through Providence alongside His natural laws without the use of a miracle (cf. James 5:17-18).
  - D. The Providence of God is a biblical worldview...
    - 1. Pantheism claims that everything is God.
    - 2. Deism claims that God has no involvement in His world.
    - Dualism states that God shares control with another being.
    - 4. Indeterminism states that there is no control at all in the universe.
    - 5. Determinism claims a strict control that removes man's responsibility.
    - 6. The doctrine of chance claims there is no rational control in the world.
    - 7. The doctrine of fate states there is no benevolent control in the world.
- II. The Times and Seasons of Life

(Ecclesiastes 3:1-15)

- A. Solomon declared that there is a season (an appointed time) and a time (a period of duration) for everything in this world.
- B. This paints a picture of the providence of God in the creation and order of the world (not determinative [cf. 7:17]).
- C. Every person will experience these occurrences in life!
- D. God has designed the world this way and informed man so he may prepare for and learn from these events.
- E. In order to succeed, man must live by wisdom not seeking to circumvent God's seasons and times, but submitting and surrendering to them.
- F. Everything God has made or ordained is beautiful in its time.
- G. To help man see this beauty, God has placed eternity into the hearts of all that we might have a glimpse of His grander purpose.
