## THE POWER OF THE LORD'S SUPPER

Text: Matthew 26:17, 26-29

## Introduction:

- 1. The Lord's Supper is a vital part of the Christian's life and worship.
- 2. Yet, there are things about it that are often misunderstood or misrepresented in the religious world.
- 3. But, when it is understood and participated in scripturally, it has a powerful influence in one's life.
- I. The Principles of the Lord's Supper
  - A. The Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus.
  - B. The Lord's Supper consists of two elements or emblems:
    - 1. Unleavened Bread
      - a. At the time of Passover, no leaven was allowed in Jewish houses.
      - b. The unleavened bread symbolizes the sinlessness of Jesus.
      - c. The bread represents the body of Jesus that was sacrificed for sin.
    - 2. Fruit of the Vine
      - a. The usual Greek word for wine is never used.
      - b. It is the juice of the grape, symbolizing the purity of Jesus' blood.
      - c. The juice represents the blood of Jesus offered for sin.
      - d. \*Note Matt. 26:28 "for the remission of sins"
  - C. The Lord's Supper is partaken of in the Lord's Kingdom the church.
  - D. The Lord's Supper is communion with the Lord (cf. 1 Cor. 10:16).
  - E. The Lord's Supper is partaken of each first day of the week when the church is assembled for worship (Acts 20:7).
- II. The Perverting of the Lord's Supper
  - A. The Lord's Supper does not have the power to forgive sins.
    - 1. Some claim this because it is connected to the blood of Jesus.
    - 2. The blood of Jesus washes away sin in baptism (Acts 22:16; Rev. 1:9).
    - 3. John 6:26-36, 48-69; cf. Matt. 4:4
  - B. The Lord's Supper does not have the power heal the sick (1 Cor. 11:30).
    - 1. Some will give communion to the sick in an attempt to heal them.
    - 2. This passage is speaking of spiritual sickness due to their sinful attitudes and corrupt worship.
  - C. The Lord's Supper does not have the power to substitute for other acts of worship.
