DAY FIVE: MYTHS ABOUT THE RETURN OF JESUS THE PARABLE OF THE FAR COUNTRY MANSIONS IN HEAVEN

Luke 19; John 14

Introduction:

- 1. This week began with a study of the birth of Jesus.
- 2. Of course, Jesus was born into this world so He could die on the cross shedding His blood for the forgiveness of man's sins.
- 3. Following His death, Jesus was buried in a tomb from which he arose on the third day.
- 4. Finally, He ascended back to His Father in Heaven, with a promise that He would return.
- 5. There are many myths in the religious world about what will happen when Jesus returns.
- 6. In this lesson, we will seek to answer those myths by studying what the Bible teaches about Jesus' second coming.
- I. The Parable of the Far Country

(Luke 19:11-27)

- A. This parable is often called the Parable of the Pounds.
- B. The purpose of this parable is to teach about the kingdom of God.
 - 1. The story of Zacchaeus (vs. 1-10) shows that God loves all and wants them to be a part of His kingdom if they will repent and obey.
 - a. This emphasizes the spiritual nature of the kingdom.
 - b. It shows the purpose of the kingdom to seek and save the lost.
 - 2. The statement that Jesus was near to Jerusalem shows that the kingdom will be brought into existence by His sacrifice on the cross.
 - 3. The fact that they thought the kingdom "should immediately appear" shows that they misunderstood many things about it.
 - a. They thought that God's kingdom was a material one.
 - b. They expected Jesus to claim the throne when He entered into Jerusalem (19:28-40).
 - c. Thus, this parable explains that the kingdom would not appear as they thought.
- C. The parable teaches that the kingdom would be given to Jesus when He ascended to His Father in Heaven (cf. Dan. 7:13-14; Psa. 24:7-10; Acts 2:32-36; Eph. 1:20-23; 1 Pet. 3:21-22).
- D. Thus, those who become citizens of that kingdom are required to be faithful until the King returns.
- E. When the King returns, there will be a day of reckoning judgment (2 Cor. 5:10).
 - 1. The faithful in the kingdom will be rewarded.
 - 2. The fearful in the kingdom will be punished.
 - 3. Those who reject the King (outside of the kingdom) will be destroyed.
- F. Thus, we learn that Jesus will return to judge the world!

- II. Myths about the Return of Jesus
 - A. **Myth One:** Jesus is not going to return.
 - 1. The Bible warned that some would believe and teach this (2 Pet. 3:3-7).
 - 2. The Bible declares plainly that Jesus will return.
 - 3. 1 out of every 25 verses in the New Testament refers to Jesus' return!
 - 4. The prophets predicted Jesus' return (Jude 1:14-15).
 - 5. The angels proclaimed Jesus' return (Acts 1:11).
 - 6. The disciples preached Jesus' return (1 Thes. 4:16-17; 2 Thes. 1:6-10; Heb. 9:27-28).
 - 7. Jesus promised to return (John 14:1-3; Matt. 16:27; 24:27; 25:31).
 - B. **Myth Two**: The time of Jesus' return can be known.
 - 1. Many have tried and continue to try to predict the date of the Lord's return.
 - 2. They claim that there are signs that tell us when Jesus will come back.
 - 3. Generally, they find these 'signs' in three places:
 - a. Old Testament prophecy but they have already been fulfilled (Heb. 1:1-2; Luke 16:16; 1 Cor. 2:7ff).
 - b. <u>The book of Revelation</u> but they misapply symbolic, apocalyptic language that was about things that were to "shortly come to pass" (Rev. 1:1).
 - c. Matthew 24
 - i. This chapter is divided into two sections.
 - ii. Verses 1 35 deal with the destruction of Jerusalem by Rome in AD 70.
 - iii. Verses 36 51 deal with the end of time and the second coming of Jesus (cf. 25:1-46).
 - iv. The so-called 'signs of the times' are given in the first section and concern the destruction of Jerusalem.
 - v. In fact, He focused their attention on one sign the abomination of desolation, referring to idolaters in the Temple of God (Dan. 9:24-27).
 - vi. Luke's account explains it clearly: "And when ye shall see Jerusalem compassed with armies, then know that the desolation thereof is nigh" (Luke 21:20).
 - vii. Verses 29-31 describe the fall of Jerusalem as a judgment (or, coming) of the Lord.
 - viii. Verse 34 emphasizes that the message and its fulfillment were for THAT generation.
 - 4. However, when it comes to the end of the world, Jesus declared, "But of that day and hour knoweth no man..." (24:36).
 - 5. No man knows when the Lord will return; and, therefore, no one can predict it (1 Thes. 5:2; Matt. 25:13; Mark 13:34-35; Luke 12:39-40; 2 Pet. 3:10).
 - 6. Instead, all must prepare for it (Matt. 24:37-51; 1 Thes. 5:1).
 - C. **Myth Three**: Jesus is coming back secretly in the Rapture.
 - 1. Some claim that Jesus will return for the saved (both living and dead) in a secret, silent coming that they call the Rapture.
 - 2. In the Rapture, they say that the saved will vanish from the face of the earth and ascend up to Heaven to be with the Lord.
 - 3. It should be noted that the word 'rapture' is never found in the Bible.
 - 4. This belief comes from a misunderstanding of 1 Thessalonians 4:16-17.
 - 5. However, this passage does not teach a secret, silent coming of Jesus.

- 6. Instead, there is a "shout," "the voice of the archangel," and the sounding of the "trump of God."
- 7. This passage also teaches that those who are "caught up together" will be with the Lord forever.
 - a. Those who believe in the Rapture say that those who are 'raptured' will be with the Lord for 7 years.
 - b. During that time there will be a great tribulation upon the earth.
 - c. After the 7 years, those who were raptured will be returned to earth to live for 1,000 years in the Lord's kingdom.
 - d. None of these things are taught in the Bible!
 - e. Many symbolic passages are misinterpreted to fit this fanciful theory.
- 8. The return of Jesus will be...
 - a. Personal (1 Thes. 4:16-17)
 - b. Reasonable (Acts 1:11)
 - c. Visible (Rev. 1:7; 1 John 3:2)
 - d. Audible (1 Thes. 4:16) e. Powerful (2 Thes. 1:7-9)
- 9. There will be only one resurrection in which both the righteous and wicked are raised (John 5:28-29; 11:24; Acts 24:15; 1 Cor. 15:23-26).
- 10. There will be only one Day of Judgment in which both the righteous are rewarded and the wicked condemned (Acts 17:30-31).
- 11. There will be only one return of Jesus for the entire world (Rev. 1:7; 2 Pet. 3:10; 1 Tim. 6:13-14; 2 Tim. 4:1, 8; 1 Cor. 15:52; etc.).
- D. **Myth Four:** Jesus is coming back to establish an earthly kingdom.
 - 1. Many teach that Jesus came the first time to establish an earthly kingdom.
 - 2. However, they say, because the Jews rejected Him as their King, He was unable to accomplish this goal.
 - a. Yet, this is exactly what the Jews wanted (Luke 19:38; John 12:12-13; Acts 1:6).
 - b. They even tried to make Him their King (John 6:14-15).
 - c. But, Jesus declared that His kingdom was not of this world that is, it was spiritual rather than physical (John 18:36; cf. Luke 17:20-21).
 - 3. This doctrine makes Jesus a failure.
 - a. It means that God's prophecies and promises from the Old Testament were wrong.
 - b. It means that both God the Father and Jesus the Son were wrong when they stated that the kingdom would be established.
 - c. It means that the Holy Spirit was wrong when He inspired men to write those words.
 - d. It means that the Bible was incorrect and cannot be trusted.
 - e. Without doubt, a doctrine like this must be rejected!
 - 4. Jesus succeeded in establishing His kingdom a spiritual kingdom rather than a physical one.
 - a. He promised that some who heard Him speak would live to see the kingdom come with power (Mark 9:1).
 - b. The kingdom came with power on the Day of Pentecost (Acts 1:8; 2:1-4, 47).
 - c. The church is the kingdom of Christ (Matt. 16:18-19).
 - d. Thus, Christians are in the kingdom (Col. 1:13; Rev. 1:9).
 - 5. Jesus is already sitting and reigning on David's throne (Acts 2:29-36).

- 6. Therefore, He is not coming back to establish an earthly kingdom.
- 7. Instead, He will deliver the kingdom to the Father (1 Cor. 15:24).
- E. **Myth Five:** Jesus is coming back reign on the earth for 1,000 years.
 - 1. Many teach that there will be a literal Millennium 1,000 year reign of Jesus on the earth.
 - 2. This is based on a misunderstanding and misapplication of Revelation 20 and its use of the phrase "thousand years."
 - 3. This is a highly symbolic chapter in a highly symbolic book and, symbols are not to be taken literally.
 - a. In this chapter there is a dragon, a key, a chain, a seal, and many other things that are symbols and not understood to be literal.
 - b. The same is true of the 1,000 years this is not a literal period of time.
 - 4. Jesus is already reigning over His kingdom, the church.
 - 5. When He comes back it will be to judge the world, not to set up a kingdom upon it (John 5:22; Acts 10:42; 17:31; Rom. 2:16; 14:10-12; 2 Cor. 5:10; 2 Tim. 4:1; Rev. 20:11-12).
 - 6. In fact, when He returns, the earth (along with the rest of the universe) will be destroyed (2 Peter 3:10-12)!

III. Mansions in Heaven

(John 14:1-6)

- A. Jesus is coming again!
- B. He is coming to raise the dead (John 5:28-29; Phil. 3:20-21).
- C. He is coming to judge the world (John 5:22; Acts 10:42; 17:31; Rom. 2:16; 14:10-12; 2 Cor. 5:10; 2 Tim. 4:1; Rev. 20:11-12).
- D. He is coming to deliver the kingdom (the church) to the Father (1 Cor. 15:24).
- E. This means that the faithful will be taken to Heaven, to dwell in the presence of God forever!
- F. John 14 gives a beautiful description of Heaven...
 - 1. It is a place that is prepared by the Lord.
 - 2. It is a place that is prepared for the faithful and saved.
 - 3. It is a place where the Lord dwells.
 - 4. It is a place where the Father dwells.
 - a. It is called the Father's house.
 - b. In the Father's house there are many mansions.
 - c. This means that there are many dwellings.
 - d. Likely, it refers to Heaven as a mansion with many rooms.
 - e. This indicates that there is a place for all the saved to live in the Father's house forever.
 - 5. It is a place to which we can know the way.
- G. Making it to Heaven will be like coming home!
