I. The Cup of Communion

- A. The shepherd provides for the sheep in every way possible and he does so abundantly.
- B. His care for them demonstrates ownership, fellowship, and affection.
- C. The imagery also describes the hospitality of a king (cf. Gen. 43:16; 2 Sam. 9:7; etc.).
 - 1. The table was prepared with a feast.
 - 2. The guests were anointed (cf. Luke 7:46).
 - 3. The cups were filled.
- D. An empty cup meant it was time to leave; a full cup meant the feast continued; and an overflowing cup meant abundant welcome.
- E. The Good Shepherd offers His flock the cup of communion (Luke 22:20; 1 Cor. 10:16; 11:25-28).

II. The Assurance of Abundance

- A. The age-old question: "Is the cup half-empty or is the cup half-full?"
 - 1. One's answer determines his view of life and its circumstances.
 - 2. Pessimism can produce jealousy, envy, and hate.
- B. Yet, with the Lord, the cup is always overflowing!
