Genesis 3:15

Defeat of the Serpent

Text: Genesis 3:1-15

Introduction:

- 1. God created man in His own image with an eternal soul and without sin (1:26-27).
- 2. He created a garden in Eden to be the perfect home for man (2:7-9).
- 3. He allowed man to eat of every tree of the garden, save one (2:15-16).
- 4. He commanded man not to eat of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil (2:17).
- 5. For a time, man lived in harmony with God in the Garden of Eden...

I. THE FALL OF MAN

- A. Satan, using the form of a serpent, tempted Eve to eat of the forbidden fruit (3:1-5).
 - 1. Satan was timely approaching Eve (cf. Matt. 4:1ff).
 - 2. Satan was sly focusing on the negative.
 - 3. Satan was subtle creating doubt in God.
 - 4. Satan was deceptive changing God's Word with an addition ("not").
 - 5. Satan was tricky crafting trust in himself while impugning God's love.
 - 6. Satan was ruthless appealing to man's desires while knowing the result.
- B. Eve allowed herself to be deceived, followed her own wisdom, will, and desire, and yielded to temptation (cf. 1 Tim. 2:14; 2 Cor. 11:3; 1 John 2:15-17).
- C. She ate of the fruit and gave some to Adam who also ate of it (3:6).
- D. Thus, sin entered into the world and man began to suffer its consequences (3:7-24).

II. THE PROPHECY OF VICTORY

- A. Satan had been victorious in this battle against man.
- B. It seemed that he might even win the war against God.
- C. However, in the midst of this darkness, God gave a prophetic promise that would give light to the world and all mankind.
- D. To the serpent, God said, "And I will put enmity between thee and the woman, and between thy seed and her seed; it shall bruise thy head, and thou shalt bruise his heel" (Genesis 3:15).
 - 1. There would be enmity (hostility, hatred; thus, conflict) between Satan and men.
 - 2. There would be conflict between Satan and the seed of woman.
 - a. This may hint at the virgin birth of Jesus (cf. Isa. 7:14; Jer. 31:22; Matt. 1:20-21; Luke 1:34-35).
 - b. It is of note that the word 'seed' is singular and refers to a man ("he," "his").
 - i. Genesis 22:18 "thy seed" (from Abraham)
 - ii. 2 Samuel 7:12-14 "thy seed" (from David)
 - iii. Galatians 3:16 "thy seed, which is Christ" (cf. Matthew 1:1)
 - 3. He Jesus would bruise the head of Satan, meaning that He would deliver a crushing, defeating blow.
- E. This is a prophecy of victory in the face of defeat.
- F. It is a picture of love and grace through which God would work to restore fellowship with man.

III. THE TRIUMPH OF JESUS

- A. Jesus won a three-fold victory over Satan.
- B. First, He defeated sin by living a sinless life.
 - 1. Hebrews 4:15; 9:28
 - 2. 1 Peter 2:22
- C. Second, He defeated death by rising from the grave.
 - 1. Acts 2:22-24
 - 2. 1 Corinthians 15:54-57
- D. Third, He defeated Satan by taking his power and thwarting his plans.
 - 1. Hebrews 2:14-15
 - 2. 1 John 3:8
 - 3. Romans 16:20; Ephesians 4:8; Colossians 2:15
 - 4. Revelation 20:10
- E. Victory is won!

Conclusion:

- 1. We acquire this victory by having our sins washed away by the blood of Jesus (Revelation 1:5; Acts 22:16).
- 2. We continue to be cleansed by Jesus' blood when we live faithful lives (1 John 1:7).
- 3. Thus, we must live in victory (1 Corinthians 15:58)!
