Zechariah 13:1-6

A Fountain for Sin

Text: Zechariah 13:1-6

Introduction:

- 1. God had promised that the seed of woman would crush the head of the serpent and the enemy of man would be defeated (Genesis 3:15).
- 2. He showed that this victory would include blessedness for all through the seed of Abraham (Genesis 12:1-3).
- 3. This Victor would be a mediator (Job 19:23-27), a ruler (Genesis 49:10), a star (Numbers 24:17), a prophet (Deuteronomy 18:15-19), a priest (1 Samuel 2:35), and a king (1 Samuel 2:10) ruling from the throne of David (1 Chronicles 17:11-14).
- 4. During the time of David, the "sweet psalmist of Israel" (2 Samuel 23:1) recorded many prophecies of Jesus in the Psalms.
- 5. In the writings of the prophets, much more detail about the coming Messiah was given.
- 6. Zechariah showed that the Messiah would provide the remedy for sin...

I. THE BACKGROUND

(ZECHARIAH 12:10)

- A. In the time of Zechariah, the city of Jerusalem and the Temple had just been rebuilt.
- B. He revealed that physical Israel rejected the Shepherd and, therefore, God rejected them.
- C. Then, he revealed the victory of the faithful.
- D. No matter what enemy would come against the church, spiritual Jerusalem is a stone that cannot be moved (cf. Heb. 12:28).
- E. The Messiah would be pierced, making God's grace available to all man and causing godly sorrow that would lead many to repentance.
- F. Now, Zechariah will show the benefits of the Messiah's suffering for the sins of the world.

II. THE PROPHECY

(ZECHARIAH 13:1-6)

- A. The piercing of the Savior caused a fountain to be opened in which all sin and uncleanness could be washed away (cf. Job 9:30-31; Psa. 51:2, 7; Isa. 1:18; John 1:29; 19:34-35; 1 Cor. 6:11; Eph. 5:25-27; Titus 3:5-7; Heb. 9:13-14; 1 Jn. 1:7; 1 Pet. 1:18-19; Rev. 1:5; 7:13-14).
 - 1. This fountain could do what nothing else could wash away sins!
 - 2. It is a "fountain filled with blood, drawn from Immanuel's veins; and sinners plunged beneath that flood lose all their guilty stains!"
- B. Because of this fountain, sinners would become saints as citizens of the Lord's kingdom.
- C. In the Messiah's kingdom, there would be no more idolatry.
 - 1. There is no place for idolatry in the Lord's church (1 Corinthians 10:16-22).
 - 2. True fellowship with God removes any form of idolatry (Matthew 6:24; 2 Corinthians 6:14-18; Ephesians 4:4-6).
- D. In the Messiah's kingdom, there would be an end of prophetic work (cf. 1 Cor. 13:10).
 - 1. When revelation was completed, there would be no need for prophets or any other miraculous work.
 - 2. All Christians would be servants with no special classes or hierarchy among them.

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Prophecy of Jesus

- 3. Note that verse 3 emphatically teaches that prophecy would cease in the Lord's church for revelation would be competed and anyone claiming to be a prophet is without a doubt a false prophet!
- E. In the Messiah's kingdom, there would be no unclean spirits for Satan was defeated.
 - 1. This may refer to the "lying spirits" of false prophets (cf. 1 Kings 22:22; etc.).
 - 2. However, it seems to refer to all demonic powers meaning, there would be no demon possession after the age of miracles (cf. Matthew 12:43; Luke 11:20).
- F. What a time of blessing is found in the Lord's church!

III. THE FULFILLMENT

(JOHN 19:14-16)

- A. The piercing of the Messiah refers to the crucifixion of Jesus.
- B. It involved wounds in His hands (cf. Psalm 22:16; Luke 24:39; John 20:27).
- C. It involved wounds received by His own people (cf. John 1:11; Acts 7:51-52).
- D. Yet it resulted in the greatest enemy of man being defeated sin is overcome with salvation!
