Beatitudes What The Bible Teaches About Being Blessed

BLESSED IS THE MAN WHO TRUSTS IN THE LORD

Text: Psalm 2

Introduction:

- 1. "Where the word *blessed* is hung out as a sign, we may be sure that we shall find a godly man within." *Sir Richard Baker*
- 2. Biblically, the word "blessed" refers to those whose sufficiency comes from God and not from the circumstances of life.
- 3. The "blessed" are those who inherit the promise made to Abraham by conforming to God's Will and being added to the body of Christ.
- 4. This psalm contrasts self-righteousness with God's righteousness, man's way with God's way, and rebellion with submission.
- I. Man's Rebellion Against God (vs. 1-3)
 - A. The kings of the earth set themselves against God and His plan of redemption.
 - B. The word "heathen" refers to the Gentile nations.
 - 1. They rage as a tumultuous sea against the God of Heaven.
 - 2. They array themselves in hostility and stand against God and His divine authority.
 - 3. The NT commentary on this passage is Romans 1:18-32
 - a. Idiocy (1:21)
 - b. Idolatry (1:22-23)
 - c. Immorality (1:24-32)
 - C. The word "people" refers to the Israelites God's chosen people.
 - 1. They meditate on their own schemes which are empty.
 - 2. They take counsel with one another in rejection of God's authority.
 - 3. The NT commentary on this passage is Romans 2:1-29
 - a. Self-righteousness
 - b. Immorality
 - D. Their desire was to break the bands of God's authority.
 - E. The result was a rejection of God's scheme of redemption culminating in the coming of the Messiah.
 - 1. Thus, the Gentiles ignored the coming of Christ.
 - 2. And the Jews rejected Jesus as the Messiah.
- II. God's Rejection Of Man (vs. 4-9)
 - A. In spite of man's rebellion, God still rules in the earth.
 - B. He laughs at man's attempts to thwart His plan.
 - C. He will punish those who rebel against Him.
 - D. And, when all is said and done, God's King Jesus sits upon the throne.
 - E. He reigns as God's Son (cf. Ac. 13:33; Heb. 1:5; 5:5).
 - F. His kingdom reaches around the world, even among the Gentiles.
 - G. He brings to naught the kingdoms of men that rebel against Him.

- III. Man's Response to God (vs. 10-12)
 - A. The wise thing to do is to be instructed of God by His Word.
 - B. Instead of rebelling, the wise person will serve God with reverence!
 - C. Instead of constructing a man-made plan of salvation, the wise man will submit to the doctrine of the Son!
 - D. The blessed man is one who puts his trust in God not in man!
 - 1. We must not serve the "God of our choice."
 - 2. We cannot choose the "Messiah of our choice."
 - 3. We dare not follow the "plan of salvation of our choice."
 - 4. We should not join the "church of our choice."
 - 5. We will not create the "worship of our choice."

Conclusion:

- 1. Rebellion against God begins (and ends) with our attitude toward His authority.
- 2. If we rebel, God will reject and punish us.
- 3. The blessed man recognizes that God is sovereign and puts his trust in Him.
- 4. The blessed man submits to the will of God the New Testament of Christ.
- 5. The blessed man will not trust his soul to the doctrines of men.
