Practical Prayer

Prayer Is Providential

Text: 2 Corinthians 12:7-10

INTRODUCTION:

- 1. There is a God who hears and responds to prayer!
- 2. However, His answer to one's prayer is often different than expected or desired.
- 3. Sometimes, God's answer to one's prayer is, "No" or "Wait."
- 4. It is helpful to understand the connection between God's providence and the answer to payer.
- I. WHEN GOD SAYS, "NO"
 - A. God encourages His children to pray to Him in all situations and to ask for what they think is best (Philippians 4:6-7; Matthew 7:7-8; 1 Peter 5:7).
 - B. However, there are times when God does not grant the request asked of Him.
 - C. This does not mean that the petitioner has been rejected.
 - 1. Consider the request of Moses (Deuteronomy 3:23-27).
 - a. Remember the sin of Moses (Psalm 106:32-33; Numbers 20:10-12).
 - b. This does not mean that Moses was not forgiven.
 - 2. God had a greater purpose for Moses *to teach His people the serious nature of sin.*
 - 3. God had a greater blessing for Moses (Luke 9:30-31; Revelation 15:3).
 - D. Often, man's petition is not for what is truly best.
 - E. Because God works through His providence, He acts with grace for man's best interest (cf. 2 Corinthians 12:7-10).
 - F. Thus, for the child of God, there are no "unanswered" prayers.

II. WHEN GOD SAYS, "WAIT"

- A. There are times when God wants His children to wait for the answer to prayer.
- B. Again, this is always for the good of the petitioner and in harmony with the will of God even if it is difficult to comprehend in the moment.
- C. Often, God wants to deepen one's understanding (Job 19:7; 30:20; 42:1-6).
- D. Sometimes, God wants to strengthen one's faith (Matthew 15:21-28).
- E. Always, God is working to accomplish His purpose (Mark 5:22-42).
- F. At times, God is seeking to demonstrate His power (John 11).
- G. Ultimately, God is striving to encourage obedience (Luke 23:34).

CONCLUSION:

- 1. God hears and answers every prayer of His faithful children.
- 2. Sometimes the answer is different from what we want to hear.
- 3. Yet, when we understand that God is working through His providence on our behalf, we learn to trust that His answer is both right and good.
- 4. Thus, we are encouraged to "pray without ceasing" (1 Thessalonians 5:17).

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Exercises

Prayer Is Predicated

1.	Read Isaiah 59:1-2. What does this passage indicate will keep one's prayers from being heard? Each of us must examine ourselves before we pray.
2.	Read Psalm 66:18 and Proverbs 28:9. What must I do if I want my prayers to be answered by God? Each of us must look into our hearts and motives before we pray.
3.	Read Luke 18:9-14. In this parable, whose prayer was heard? Why? Whose prayer was not heard? Why? What is the lesson of this parable?
