THE SOULS UNDER THE ALTAR

Introduction

- 1. Chapter 6 began with the opening of the first four seals.
- 2. John saw imagery of the so-called "four horsemen of the Apocalypse."
- 3. The victory of the Gospel was followed by persecution of those who obeyed it.
 - a. They suffered bloodshed from physical and spiritual conflict.
 - b. They suffered from famine, being unable to work due to persecution.
 - c. They suffered death from any means available to the persecutors.
- 4. Now, John's attention is turned to the opening of the 5th and 6th seals...
- I. The Opening of the Fifth Seal

(6:9-11)

- A. With the opening of the fifth seal, the scene changed significantly.
- B. John saw the results of the persecution illustrated by the four horsemen the souls of Christians who had been killed for their faithfulness to God.
 - 1. Note the symbolism; John saw souls that which is invisible.
 - 2. They had been slain for the word of God (cf. 1:9; 2:13).
 - 3. Examples (Matthew 24:9; John 16:2; Acts 7:58-59; 12:1-3; 2 Timothy 1:8; 4:6; etc.)
- C. The souls of these Christians were seen under the altar, like the blood of animals sacrificed under the Old Covenant (Lev. 4:7).
- D. These martyrs cried out for vengeance! "How long?"
 - 1. This illustrates the idea that the persecution against the church had been going on for some time.
 - 2. Further, it demonstrates God's faithfulness to His promises and His justness (cf. Genesis 4:10; Hebrews 12:24; Job 9:32-33; 1 John 2:1-2).
 - 3. God will avenge the righteous (Luke 18:7-8), but in His own time (Romans 12:19-21).
- E. God's answer to them was two-fold.
 - 1. First, they were given white robes, symbolizing the fact that God had not forgotten them or their faithfulness.
 - 2. Second, they were told to rest and wait a little longer.
 - a. The persecution would not end immediately.
 - b. In fact, there were still others who would be killed for their faith (17:6).
- F. Though God's judgment was not coming immediately, there must be no doubt that it was coming.
- II. The Opening of the Sixth Seal

(6:12-17)

- A. The opening of the sixth seal revealed the judgment of God that would come upon those who persecuted the church.
- B. The symbolism of this passage is used throughout Scripture to describe God's judgment upon a nation or the world (cf. Isaiah 13:9-13; 29:6; 50:3; Jeremiah 4:23-28; Joel 2:10, 30-31; 3:15; Amos 8:9; Haggai 2:6-7; Matthew 24:29-30; Acts 2:19-20).
 - 1. "The Lord pictures a crashing world, earth-shaking events with no light to guide, and darkness engulfing wicked people" (H. Hailey).

Lesson Fourteen

- 2. Verses 15-16 make it clear that this is not the final judgment and the end of the world.
- 3. Instead, this is a judgment of God against Rome and the persecutors of the Christians.
- C. The earthquake symbolizes the shaking of that which appears to be unshakeable and immovable.
- D. The darkening of the sun and moon symbolizes the removal of leadership and light by which a nation is guided.
- E. The falling of stars symbolizes the casting down of a nation's rulers (cf. Isaiah 14:12; Daniel 8:10; etc.).
- F. The sky being rolled up like a scroll symbolizes the end of a world power.
 - 1. When one finishes reading a scroll, it is rolled up and put away.
 - 2. Likewise, when God brings a nation's time to an end, it is as if He has rolled up their scroll (cf. Isaiah 34:4).
- G. The moving of the mountains and islands symbolizes the crumbling of all that was accounted as a source of strength or a foundation (cf. Ezekiel 26:15-18; 27:34-35).
- H. All classes of men would seek to hide from the judgment of God, but it could not be escaped (cf. Hosea 10:8; Isaiah 2:19; Luke 23:28-30).
- I. When the great day of God's wrath comes, no one will be able to stand save for those washed by the blood of the Lamb.

Conclusion:

- 1. As the Lamb opens the seals of this scroll, we are given a view of the suffering inflicted upon God's people by their Roman persecutors.
- 2. Christians were being conquered, their blood was being shed, and they suffered famine and death.
- 3. Their souls cried out for vengeance and vindication for their wrongful deaths.
- 4. God promises that judgment is coming, and the persecutors will suffer for their sins.
- 5. The day of God's wrath upon the wicked is the day of deliverance for the faithful.
