Beatitudes What The Bible Teaches About Being Blessed

JESUS' BEATITUDES AND THE PLAN OF SALVATION

Text: Matthew 5:1-12

Introduction:

- 1. The biblically blessed are those who depend upon God.
- 2. They inherit the promise made to Abraham by submission to God.
- 3. Jesus begins the Sermon on the Mount by describing foundational attitudes that are necessary to follow Him.
- 4. These attitudes are also essential to salvation.
- 5. Consider the relationship between the beatitudes of Jesus and the plan of salvation...

I. The Blessedness of Salvation

- A. True blessedness is not about material or physical blessings.
- B. Rather, it comes from one's salvation from sin and fellowship with God.
- C. God's promise to Abraham was the hope of true forgiveness through the Messiah salvation for all through the sacrifice of Jesus (Genesis 12:1-3; John 3:16; Galatians 3:16).
- D. When this spiritual blessing is received, all other spiritual blessings flow from it (Ephesians 1:3).
 - 1. Peace
 - 2. Hope
 - 3. Joy
- E. This is true blessedness.
- F. This state of blessedness is built upon certain attitudes that enable one to understand and acquire it.
- G. Thus, the beatitudes of Jesus in the sermon on the mount have a direct relationship to the Gospel plan of salvation.

II. The Attitudes that Produce Salvation

- A. The Christian life begins in the heart (Romans 12:2; Ephesians 4:22-24).
- B. Humility
 - 1. To be "poor in spirit" is to be humble, recognizing one's need for and complete dependence upon God.
 - 2. Thus, one who is humble will be open to **hearing** the Word of God (cf. Matthew 10:14; 11:15; 12:42; 13:13-18; 17:5).
 - 3. Humble hearing of the Gospel will produce **faith** (Romans 10:17).

C. Godly Sorrow

- 1. Humility must be joined with a heart that is tender and sincere, willing to mourn over sin.
- 2. Learning the truth of the Gospel causes godly sorrow the realization that Jesus suffered and died for my sins (cf. Acts 9:9).
- 3. Godly sorrow produces **repentance** (2 Corinthians 7:10; Luke 13:3).

Beatitudes

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D. Meekness

- 1. One who turns from sin in repentance demonstrates a strength of character and conviction.
- 2. This strength is joined with submission to the Savior, producing the gentleness of meekness.
- 3. The meek individual is not ashamed of what he has learned to be true.
- 4. Thus, he boldly **confesses** his **faith in Jesus** (Romans 1:16; 10:9-10).

E. Hunger for Righteousness

- 1. One who is willing to make the good confession will not be hindered from obeying whatever the Lord commands.
- 2. In fact, he will hunger and thirst for righteousness.
- 3. So, when the Lord commands **baptism** for the remission of sins, he gladly obeys (Matthew 3:13-15; Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38).
- F. One who possesses these attitudes will find salvation in Christ and the blessedness of being a child of God.

III. The Attitudes that Maintain Salvation

A. Mercy

- 1. One who has received such mercy from God cannot help but to show mercy to others (cf. Matthew 18:21-35).
- 2. The merciful will actively seek what is best for others, whether they deserve it or not.
- 3. He will serve God with compassion for his neighbor (cf. Luke 10:25-37).

B. Purity

- 1. Furthermore, he will strive to be right inwardly as he works to do right outwardly.
- 2. To keep his heart pure, he will "walk in the light" (1 John 1:7-9) maintaining his integrity, guarding his heart, and confessing his sins.

C. Reconciliation

- 1. He will also be motivated to help others come to know the peace that passes understanding, found only in Jesus.
- 2. Thus, he will evangelize with love for the Lord and for the lost (2 Corinthians 5:10-11, 14-15).

D. Endurance

- 1. Likewise, he will follow the Lord in all these good works with perseverance and endurance.
- 2. Even if persecuted, he will serve faithfully (Revelation 2:10).
- E. These attitudes enable one to maintain salvation from sin and fellowship with the Lord.
