Beatitudes What The Bible Teaches About Being Blessed

JESUS' BEATITUDES AND THE JUDGMENT OF GOD

Text: Matthew 7:1-29

Introduction:

- 1. The biblically blessed are those who depend upon God.
- 2. They inherit the promise made to Abraham by submission to God.
- 3. Jesus begins the Sermon on the Mount by describing foundational attitudes that are necessary to follow Him.
- 4. These attitudes are essential to salvation, to having a godly influence, to obeying the Law of Christ, and to maintaining proper priorities in life.
- 5. They are also essential to understanding and imitating the judgment of God.
- I. Hypocritical Judgment Condemned
 - A. When reading this passage, it is clear that Jesus does not condemn all judgment, only that which is hypocritical.
 - B. However, making a judgment about another person is a serious matter.
 - 1. The correct standard must be used and applied without partiality.
 - 2. Self-examination and correction are absolutely essential.
 - C. Jesus illustrated the fact that most are very strict when considering the faults of others while remaining very lenient when consider their own.
 - D. Yet, He instructed His disciples to help others see and remove their sins, but only after first examining and correcting oneself.
- II. Righteous Judgment Commanded

(7:6-23)

(7:1-5)

- A. Holy things like one's time and teaching should not be wasted on those who refuse to recognize their value (7:6).
- B. One who possesses the beatitudes will respect holy things and make request of God who gives what is best to His children (7:7-11).
- C. In turn, the disciple of Jesus must seek what is best for others (7:12).
- D. He will follow the strait and narrow way that leads to life (7:13-14).
- E. He will avoid false teachers by recognizing their fruit (7:15-20).
- F. Finally, he will live in obedience to the will of God (7:21-23).
- G. ALL OF THESE ACTIONS REQUIRE RIGHTEOUS JUDGMENT!
- III. Wise Judgment Demanded
 - A. The one who judges wisely will listen to and obey the commands of Jesus.
 - B. Thus, he will build the house of his faith and life on a rock-solid foundation.
 - C. One who judges foolishly will ignore or reject the words of Jesus and build upon a foundation of sand.

Conclusion:

- 1. The power of Jesus' preaching was seen in the astonishment of His hearers.
- 2. He taught with His own authority, relying on no other for He is the Son of God.
- 3. The beatitudes allow one to respect His Word and appreciate His judgment.
