Ephesians

Lesson Nineteen Brotherhood in the Church

6:21-24

Introduction:

- 1. The first part of the book of Ephesians detailed the essential nature of the church the body of Christ.
- 2. Then, Paul emphasized the kind of life that is to characterize one who is a member of that church.
- 3. As his epistle drew near its end, Paul emphasized that the Christian must fight against all things that would seek to lure him away from the Lord's church.
- 4. Now, Paul concludes this letter with a brief emphasis on the love, care, and concern that exists among members of the Lord's church.

6:21 But that ye also may know my affairs, and how I do, Tychicus, a beloved brother and faithful minister in the Lord, shall make known to you all things

- A. Paul ended the discussion of the Christian Armor by emphasizing the power and importance of prayer.
- B. He encouraged his brethren in Ephesus to pray for him, that he might continue to proclaim boldly the Gospel of Christ.
 - 1. This illustrates the idea of the brotherhood of all believers.
 - 2. Christians pray for one another.
 - 3. Christians pray for the cause of Christ and for the labors of their brethren even if they are separated by many miles.
- C. Thus, Paul understood that the Ephesians would be concerned about him and about how he was faring during his imprisonment.
 - 1. Paul cared about what was happening in Ephesus.
 - 2. He was concerned about the welfare of the church and of the individual members.
 - 3. Naturally, they also would be concerned about him.
- D. In order to inform them in more detail of his situation, Paul sent Tychicus to Ephesus.
 - 1. This speaks to the inspiration of the Bible.
 - 2. Paul did not fill his letters with personal details about his life, experiences, and imprisonment.
 - 3. What details were given always served a higher purpose of preaching the Gospel.
 - 4. Paul's letter to the Ephesians was written by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit.
- E. Tychicus was a faithful and trustworthy child of God.
 - 1. The name Tychicus means, "Fortunate or fortuitous."
 - 2. He is first mention as accompanying Paul in Acts 20:4, just before Paul met with the elders of the church at Ephesus.
 - 3. He was from Asia, the province in Asia Minor of which Ephesus was the capitol so, he was possible from Ephesus.

- 4. He is called a beloved brother a Christian, dearly loved for his faithful work and service.
- 5. He is called a faithful minister trustworthy in carrying out works of service.
- 6. He is called a fellow servant (Col. 4:7) laboring with Paul in the Gospel.
 - a. He was with Paul on his third Missionary Journey and apparently traveled with him to Jerusalem (Acts 20:4).
 - b. When Paul was in prison in Rome, Tychicus was there with him.
 - c. He was entrusted by Paul to carry a letter to Ephesus and one to Colossae (Col. 4:7).
 - d. It is possible that he went to Philemon on behalf of Onesimus (cf. Col. 4:9; Phm. 1:10).
 - e. He was with Paul between the two Roman imprisonments (Titus 3:12).
 - f. And, he was sent to Ephesus during Paul's final imprisonment in hopes that Timothy could journey to Rome (2 Tim. 4:12).

6:22 Whom I have sent unto you for the same purpose, that ye might know our affairs, and that he might comfort your hearts

- A. Tychicus had the primary duty of delivering the inspired epistle to the church at Ephesus.
- B. However, he also would be able to inform them in more detail about Paul's condition and experiences in Rome.
- C. By so doing, their hearts would be comforted.

6:23 Peace be to the brethren, and love with faith, from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ

- A. Paul concludes this epistle in the same way it began with a prayer for peace (cf. 1:2; 2:14-17; 4:3; 6:15).
- B. Peace is possible only when one is at peace with God.
- Peace with God is possible only by the blood of Christ in the church of Christ.
- D. Love is vital to the health of the church; but it must be love with faith.
 - 1. This is more than the emotion of love.
 - 2. It is true love that is based in faith built on the truth of God's Word.
 - 3. True love seeks what is best for another, based upon the teaching of Scripture.
- E. As with all blessings for the Christian, they come from the Father and the Lord.

6:24 Grace be with all them that love our Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity. Amen.

- A. Finally, he wishes for grace the favor of God to be upon his brethren.
- B. This grace is for those who love the Lord in sincerity.
 - 1. Those who hate, despise, and reject Jesus will not receive the grace of God.
 - 2. Those who love Him must do so in sincerity with incorruption and unending perpetuity (cf. 1 Cor. 15:42, 50, 53, 53; Rom. 2:7; 2 Tim. 1:10).
 - 3. This means to continue to love and obey Him, faithful unto death (John 14:15; Rev. 2:10).
- C. Amen. Let it ever be so.
